LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

At ShelterBox, we strive for a world where no one goes without Shelter after a disaster, and 2022 was an historic year for our global organization.

RECORD NUMBER SERVED

We served the most people in our 22-year history — 429,000 — work that would not have been possible without unprecedented generosity of our supporters. That's nearly three times as many people as we served the previous year.

Our work is driven by the global displacement crisis. At least 100 million people have been forced from their homes by disasters and conflicts, according to the United Nations — an all-time high. The world watched this play out in Ukraine, where war forced 8 million refugees to flee the country and displaced another 6 million within.

ShelterBox responded in Ukraine throughout 2022, while also responding to climate change-driven disasters, like flooding in Pakistan (page 18). And we continued our programmatic work in some of the world's most extreme conflict areas, including **Ethiopia, Cameroon, Burkina Faso, Syria,**

Yemen, and Mozambique. In each, we are providing the tools families need to begin their recovery.

A YEAR OF EVOLUTION

2022 was also a year of evolution for ShelterBox. Driven by our new five-year strategy (page 5), ShelterBox is working to:

1 DO MORE
by scaling up our capacity.

2 DO IT WELL
by innovating to provide the best aid packages we can.

3 DO IT TOGETHER
by working with local partners.

These three pillars were the foundation of our response to **Super Typhoon Rai** in the Philippines, where our on-the-ground staff worked with local **Rotary Clubs** and partners, deploying stock from our Cebu warehouses to deliver the largest response in our history, serving over 100,000 people.



To our longtime supporters, this means that sometimes our responses may look a little different as we innovate the types of emergency shelter and other aid items we provide. But our work remains driven by helping the people we serve and the same values that have defined ShelterBox since it was founded by a Rotary Club in Cornwall 22 years ago: integrity, flexibility, participation, and learning.

In 2022, ShelterBox USA earned **Charity Navigator's Four-Star rating** for the seventh consecutive year, and a **GuideStar Platinum seal**, demonstrating our commitment to **effectiveness, efficiency, and transparency.**

Disasters, conflicts, and climate change have created an unprecedented need for ShelterBox's work. With your support, we'll be ready to respond to this challenging disaster landscape. We are incredibly grateful for your continued support and participation. **Thank you.**

THE CLIMATE CRISIS AND EMERGENCY SHELTER

Climate change is already a humanitarian crisis.

We're seeing its impact around the world, as it makes extreme weather events like droughts, floods, tropical storms, and wildfires even worse, often in countries where many people live in extreme poverty. That means vulnerable families who play the smallest part in contributing to the climate crisis are often the ones bearing the brunt of its effects. They are forced to leave their homes to survive – either because of these disasters, or to find food, water, or to make a living.

In November 2022, the ShelterBox team visited families displaced by the severe flooding in Pakistan. There they met with our partner Islamic Relief to speak to people who had received ShelterBox tents and other essential aid items. Sadly three months after the floods, the water was still stagnant in many areas, and damage was extensive.

SHELTERBOX AND SUSTAINABILITY

While we do everything in our power to reach the people most affected by the climate crisis, we also inevitably contribute to greenhouse gas emissions. Throughout 2022, we worked harder than ever to reduce our impact on the planet.

Our priority will always be supporting people who are left without shelter after disaster. But we cannot ignore the impact this creates, and we owe it to the people we support not to increase climate change through our actions. That's why minimizing our environmental impact is one of the goals of our new strategic plan.

WE HAVE PRIORITIZED REMOVING SINGLE-USE PLASTICS FROM OUR PACKAGING.

By working closely with our suppliers over the past four years, we've avoided using 386,582 pieces of plastic.

In 2022, during our winter responses in Ukraine and Syria, we removed or reduced

- 1 Prepositioning our aid in storage hubs around the globe.
- 2 Establishing ShelterBox Operations Philippines so we can respond there more efficiently.
- 3 Looking for ways to reduce the number of times we move aid items.
- 4 Collecting carbon emissions data to understand how we can reduce our impact.
- 5 Identifying and eliminating non-essential single-use plastics in our supply chain.
- 6 Creating environmental assessment criteria for suppliers.



plastics used to package blankets, carpets, clothing, rope, tarps, and soap.

With the production of shelter equipment accounting for 83% of our emissions, using sustainable alternatives is our biggest opportunity. Buying locally to reduce freight emissions and choosing greener freight options also has a lot of potential. And we'll continue to focus on plastics reduction, which will cut emissions and reduce plastic waste where we work.

We will do all we can to reduce our environmental impact, but there will be times when we need to make less sustainable choices to reach more people, more effectively.

AND OUR FOCUS IS NOT ONLY SHELTERBOX. WE ARE A SIGNATORY TO THE HUMANITARIAN SECTOR CLIMATE CHARTER.

We will work to support best practices across the sector. Integrity is one of our guiding values, and it must be central to our thinking as we work with partners across the globe to help more people without causing harm.

SHELTER SOLUTIONS

Recovery begins with shelter.

Families who have lost their homes in a disaster or who have been forced to flee violence and war deserve sturdy and durable emergency shelter. We work hard to make sure that's exactly what we provide.

Emergency shelter is the core of what we do. Depending on the disaster, weather, and location, the shelter needs of families differ. That's why we have developed a flexible approach.

We listen and learn from the communities we work with to make sure we provide the right support.



STANDARD SHELTERBOX TENT

For some disaster-hit communities, our durable family-sized tents where they can come together as a family and feel safe and protected are the best solution until they can start rebuilding their homes.



UN TENT

These unmarked tents made to UN specifications are deployed in conflict and crisis settings where Western-branded aid can become a security issue.



SHELTER KIT

In other communities, our Shelter Kits containing tools, heavy duty tarps, ropes and fixings are needed to create emergency shelter or to repair damaged homes making them livable again.

ESSENTIAL HOUSEHOLD AID ITEMS

*A home is much more than
a roof overhead.*

That's why we also offer other disaster relief items that are essential for survival and can help to turn a shelter into a home. Essential household items like tools, blankets, mosquito nets, cooking sets, solar lights, and water filters help to meet families urgent needs, so parents can begin earning a living, children can return to school, and communities can rebuild.



THE SHELTERBOX

Our sturdy green ShelterBox, packed with custom aid items, is used for more than storage. We've seen families use it as a work bench, a wardrobe, a seat, and even a crib!

CASH ASSISTANCE

At ShelterBox, we constantly analyze how we can do even more to help communities after disasters.

Through this process, we have learned that when the conditions are right, giving a nominal amount of cash to families, alongside essential shelter materials and training, provides a more comprehensive aid package enabling communities to recover better.

HOW DOES CASH HELP FAMILIES RECOVER?

1 *Cash helps families buy what they need to rebuild.*

A family might need specific materials to fix a home. If those materials aren't part of our Shelter Kits, it can be easier for people to buy what they need locally.

2 *Cash helps kickstart local economies.*

Providing cash means that suppliers and tradespeople can start doing business again. That's a vital step towards a whole community beginning to recover.

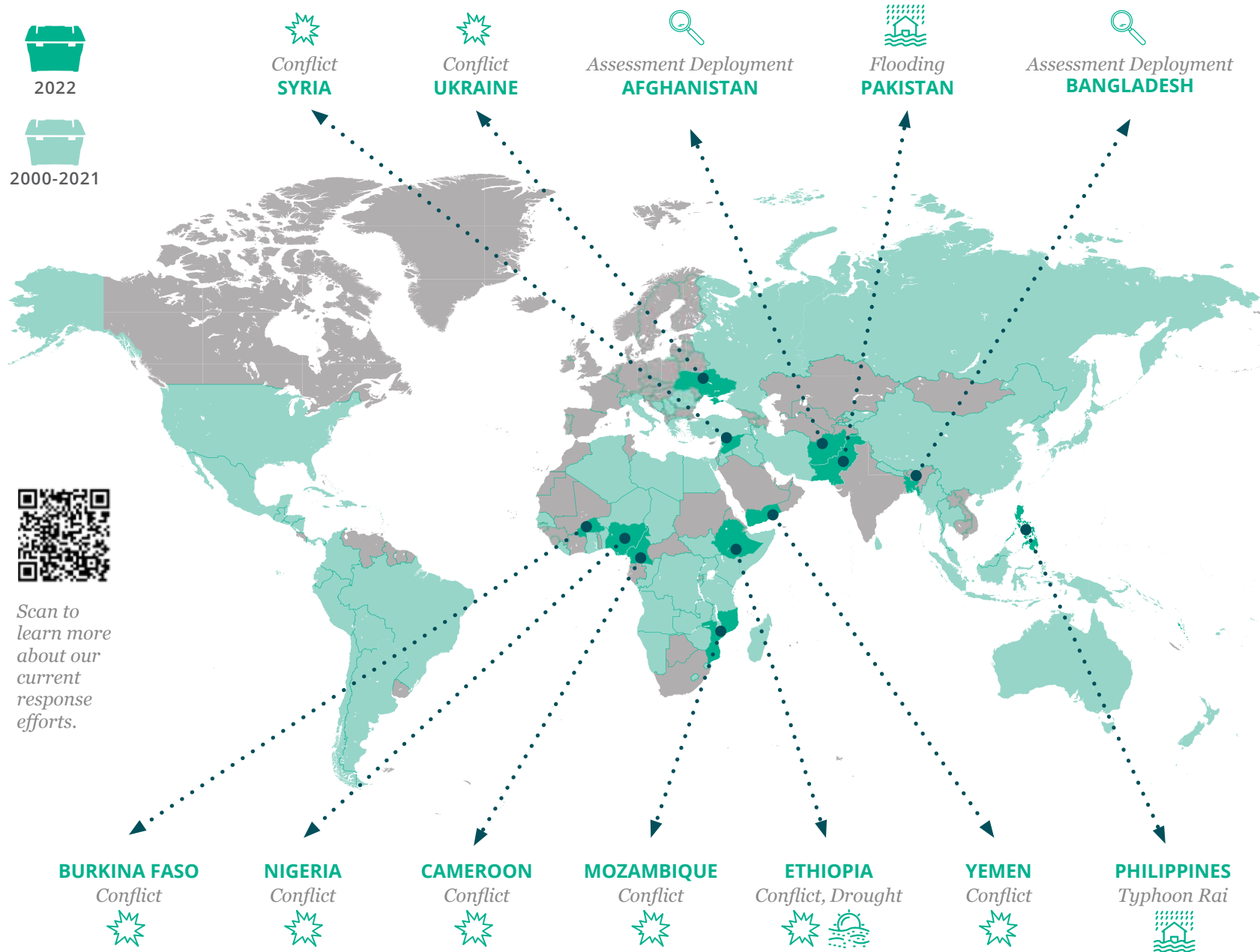
3 *Cash helps people feel a sense of autonomy.*

WAR & MASSIVE DISPLACEMENT IN UKRAINE

The Russian invasion of Ukraine in February 2022 created one of the fastest and largest displacements of people since World War II.

The conflict forced more than 12 million people, over a quarter of Ukraine's entire population, to leave their homes. Over 8.2 million fled the country and are living as refugees in neighboring countries while nearly 6 million remain internally displaced.

DEPLOYMENT HIGHLIGHT

UKRAINE

IN 2022, SHELTERBOX HELPED
MORE THAN 37,000 PEOPLE.

ShelterBox has been responding in Ukraine since the onset of the war in February 2022. In March and April our teams were in Moldova, Poland, and western Ukraine.

Throughout 2022, we supported refugees in Moldova with hygiene items such as toothpaste, soap, and sanitary products, as well as cash. We provided mattresses to collective centers in Lviv. We also provided people in Ukraine with Shelter Kits, including tarps, tools and rope, thermal blankets, solar lights, buckets and water carriers, and hygiene items to help them survive in damaged buildings.

DMYTRO AND VICTORIA'S JOURNEY TOWARDS RECOVERY

Dmytro and Victoria, community leaders of an apartment block outside Kyiv, saw their community shattered after two tank shelling attacks in March. The devastation destroyed the top floor and roof and left them without means to cook or live safely. With determination, they returned after the attacks to assess the damage and began rebuilding their lives.

Thanks to ShelterBox and the 15 Shelter Kits equipped with tarps and essential tools, they were able to clear debris, repair structures, and start rebuilding the roof. As the only organization that provided support, ShelterBox and ReliefAid played a vital role in their recovery, sparing them from the immense cost they would have faced on their own.

Their journey towards recovery is a collective effort, with families working together to rebuild and solve problems as they arise. Despite challenges in repairing shattered windows and reconnecting gas, they remain hopeful for the future. Many families plan to return permanently, striving to rebuild their community and see their children playing in the yard once again. Their ultimate hope is to find an investor to aid in the cost of reconstruction, allowing them not just to survive but to live fully and experience happiness once more.

Their resilience and hope demonstrate the power of humanity in overcoming tragedy and rebuilding a future full of possibilities.

KATERYNA'S JOURNEY FROM LOSS TO HOPE

Kateryna, a 68-year-old widow, has endured unimaginable loss since the war engulfed her homeland in Ukraine. Her family once lived a prosperous life, working together on their farm. However, the war brought devastation and tore her family apart.

Kateryna lost her son and husband to the war's cruel grip, leaving her heartbroken and shattered. Her grandchildren sought refuge abroad. Kateryna, though elderly and lonely, hopes that one day her family will reunite and rebuild their lives, despite the challenges.

As the harsh Ukrainian winter approached, ShelterBox and partner **ReliefAid**, stepped in to provide critical humanitarian aid to Kateryna.

Kateryna spoke with gratitude about the support she received.

“We were given a stove and firewood, and I knew that I wouldn't have to cook outside, as we did when the whole village was burning and crashing. I knew I could cook, and my children would not be starving. We are very grateful. You didn't leave us to our fate. I could have frozen in the house, but I can now heat it, and I know that I will not go to bed in a cold house. Thank you very much for this stove!”

Wood stoves supplied by ShelterBox have enabled individuals like Kateryna to survive the cold months.

RUSLAN AND MARINA'S STORY OF RESILIENCE


Ruslan, an electrician, and his wife, Marina, who worked for a local TV and radio station, led a comfortable life in Kyiv, Ukraine, until the Russian invasion shattered their world. They lived with their son, Timothy, in Ruslan's parents' house until a neighboring home was struck by a bomb. The shrapnel severely damaged their own house prompting them to flee. Upon returning, Ruslan realized that their home needed urgent repairs.

Teaming up with ReliefAid in Ukraine, ShelterBox provided Ruslan with essential supplies: tarps, hammers, nails, ropes, and thermal blankets.

Ruslan also highlighted the comfort of knowing they weren't alone in their struggle, saying, *"It helped knowing that there was someone there, even though I couldn't see them, looking out for us. We got the help we needed, when we needed it."*

WE REMAIN COMMITTED

ShelterBox remains committed to our vital efforts in response to the conflict in Ukraine. We are not just delivering essential items; we are delivering hope, compassion, and resilience to individuals and families like Viktoriya, Kateryna, and Ruslan. Together, we are rebuilding lives and communities.

DEPLOYMENT HIGHLIGHT

PAKISTAN

The scale of destruction caused by monsoon rains and flooding in Pakistan in 2022 is hard to imagine. Over 110 districts were declared ‘calamity hit’ by the government. Around 33 million people were affected, and millions were in urgent need of shelter.

ShelterBox moved quickly to reach some of the most vulnerable families. Working with our partner, **Islamic Relief Worldwide**, we provided emergency shelter packages to 1,200 families in Sindh and Baluchistan, two of the worst-affected provinces. Custom aid included mattresses and ground mats, blankets, water carriers, tents, mosquito nets, water filters and buckets, solar lights, tarps, tools, rope, and cook sets.

As the extent of the damage grew, we scaled our response to support a further 5,000 families with essential aid and provided cash grants so people could buy items that would make the biggest impact on their recovery. By the end of 2022, our focus was on longer-term recovery. This included working on a durable, longer-lasting shelter design that will provide greater protection from future floods.



ABDUL'S STORY: RESTORING HOPE IN PAKISTAN

Meet Abdul, a hardworking farmer living with his four beloved children in the Dadu district, Sindh, Pakistan. For generations, Abdul's family has tilled the land, finding sustenance and solace in their crops. However, this year brought an unprecedented disaster — catastrophic flooding that ravaged their village, leaving nothing but devastation in its wake. Abdul's home, his crops, and his means of livelihood were washed away, leaving him with no way to protect or provide for his children.

Without a roof over their heads, the family was exposed, forced to sleep under the

open sky, where temperatures dip close to freezing during the harsh winter nights. With the ShelterBox aid provided, Abdul and his family had the basic supplies needed to survive. They were overjoyed to finally have a roof over their heads, providing a sense of security and comfort. Necessities like clean drinking water were now accessible and the children's faces lit up with excitement as they received solar lights which helped ease their fears of darkness.

Abdul and his family now embrace a future filled with possibility. As the long road to recovery unfolds, ShelterBox continues to work tirelessly to empower families like Abdul's, ensuring they are not merely surviving but thriving once more.



Yemen, mired in one of the world's most dire humanitarian crises, finds itself facing a bitter civil war, famine, and a crumbling economy.

Beginning in 2014, the suffering of the Yemeni people has endured for years, prompting the UN to declare it "the worst humanitarian crisis in the world" in 2018.

The repercussions of this crisis ripple far beyond the battlefield. Widespread deprivation and a scarcity of essential services give rise to new crises each year. A staggering two-thirds of the entire population, totaling 21.6 million people, require humanitarian assistance. Thirteen percent of Yemen's population is internally displaced, with limited access to medical care and education. Most displaced individuals have seen their lives marked by constant movement, exhaustion, and extreme vulnerability.

In partnership with BCHR (Benevolence Coalition for Humanitarian Relief), ShelterBox is providing newly displaced families with UN family tents, while those in damaged shelters have received tarps and rope to fortify their homes. Families have also received essential items such as water filters, blankets, sleeping mats, solar lights, mosquito nets, water carriers, and cook sets. **ShelterBox remains dedicated to mitigating the suffering endured by families like Ali's (see Ali's Story) to bring a glimmer of hope to a population ravaged by conflict, disease, and adversity.**

ALI'S STORY: A STRUGGLE TO SURVIVE IN YEMEN

Meet Ali, one of the many affected by the crisis in Yemen. He resides in a displaced persons' camp in Yemen's Marib region with his family of eight.

Ali, once a merchandise porter, lost his livelihood when his home was destroyed during a military assault prompted by clashes in his area. Forced into Marib Camp, Ali scavenged metal scraps, materials, and oil drums to construct a rudimentary shelter for his family. Others in the camp have even less, resorting to makeshift roofs of palm branches under trees.

Before he received ShelterBox aid, Ali's living conditions were dire. He explained,

“The conditions are very difficult, there is no work, and little aid is provided to us by the organizations, and we live in a nest of straw, scrap, and some drums.”

In addition, Ali's family faces difficult conditions during the rainy season due to heavy rains and winds,” Ali explained.

“Everything gets destroyed, and we have no place to sit or sleep to be protected from the weather.”

Life in the camp is characterized by hardship, unemployment, soaring prices, and sporadic aid deliveries.

Despite these immense challenges, thanks to your support, there is hope for families like Ali's. His family now lives in a sturdy tent to protect them from the harsh Yemeni climate. They also received essential household items like water filters, blankets, sleeping mats, solar lights, mosquito nets, water carriers and cook sets.

We also included a washbasin, soap, and face masks, to help prevent the spread of disease.

DEPLOYMENT HIGHLIGHT

PHILIPPINES



Extreme weather disasters disproportionately devastate impoverished communities due to their vulnerable locations, inadequate housing, and reduced resilience caused by poverty.

In 2019, ShelterBox established an operational headquarters in the disaster-prone Philippines, enhancing our ability to respond swiftly and effectively to deadly disasters by pre-positioning aid.

In 2021, Super Typhoon Rai (Odette) became the most destructive storm to hit the Philippines, striking in mid-December and causing widespread devastation in impoverished areas. Over 1.7 million homes were damaged or destroyed. With aid stored in our Cebu warehouse, ShelterBox was one of the first charities to respond. We worked with local **Rotary** members who helped with logistics, transport and distributions, and local partners including the Philippines Navy.

From December 2021 and through the first half of 2022, ShelterBox Operations Philippines provided emergency shelter and other essential items to over 100,000 people in Cebu and Bohol — that's more than 20,000 families. Aid packages included tarps, tool sets, ropes, corrugated iron sheets, and cash to support labor costs. People returned to what was left of their homes and used Shelter Kits and salvaged materials to build simple structures to shelter in. In this early stage of recovery people are most sensitive to other shocks, events and stresses. By quickly providing emergency shelter, ShelterBox aims to support people in their recovery and help them increase their capacity to self-recover.



GINALYN'S STORY

On the island of Cebu, Ginalyn, her husband Ernesto and their four children took refuge with fourteen other families when the typhoon hit and monsoon rains began to fall. *"We were afraid because the water was coming in,"* she says. *"The next morning, the skies looked bright, but all the trees and plants and my crops were gone."*

Their family home did not survive the storm either. *"Everything was gone,"* Ginalyn recalls, *"... the roof, walls, everything, nothing was left."*

We provided Ginalyn's family with the supplies needed to rebuild and move forward: a shelter kit containing tools, rope, nails, and a solar light. *"After receiving the tarp, my husband built a temporary shelter,"* she says. *"We are much better here, and we are glad that we have our own space."*

"We use the hoe ShelterBox provided for farming, to loosen the soil and to cultivate it. We plan to rebuild our house and continue farming and planting our crops. We are very thankful for the materials that we received because without them we wouldn't have a place to stay."



SHELTERBOX'S IMPACT IN MINAWAO REFUGEE CAMP

Minawao Refugee Camp lies in the far north of Cameroon. The sprawling camp is a lifeline for the over 75,000 people who have sought refuge within its borders after fleeing brutal Boko Haram attacks in Nigeria. The experiences they bring are filled with trauma – loss of loved ones, violence, and homes turned to ashes.

As the sole provider of tents to Minawao Camp our work is as critical as ever. Upon arrival at the camp, people are held in collective centers where overcrowding leads to the rapid spread of diseases and reports of violence against women. For new arrivals, our tents serve as sanctuaries, offering families a private place to heal and rebuild their lives.

In 2022, we took our aid efforts a step further, providing solar lights, groundsheets, mosquito nets, hygiene kits, and essential water filters and carriers. These seemingly simple items have a profound impact on the emotional and physical well-being of displaced families and help kindle a sense of hope for the future. Since 2015, our unwavering commitment to providing shelter and essential aid has touched the lives of more than 26,000 families in Cameroon.

Amid shifting global crises, we stand firm in our commitment to Minawao Camp refugees. Each tent, solar light, and mosquito net represents a step towards restoring dignity and hope after unimaginable hardships.

KALTOUMI'S JOURNEY IN MINAWAO REFUGEE CAMP

As Kaltoumi reflects on the life she once knew before arriving at Minawao Camp eight years ago, memories of visiting her parents, sharing laughter with friends, tending her crops, and running her own business come flooding back. *"It all seems so far away now,"* she shared.

As she adjusted to her new reality, support from ShelterBox was crucial in helping Kaltoumi find a sense of belonging in Cameroon. Eventually her husband made it to Minawao Camp. In the years since their arrival, they have built a home and life together with their five children. Kaltoumi shared:

“ *Since I received the assistance from ShelterBox, my daily life has improved. When I arrived here, I had nothing to call my own. The tools I received were not just belongings, they were essential tools that allowed me to equip my makeshift home. Through training, I learned to wield these tools effectively, making each one an asset. The pots, plates, and blankets I received have become symbols of comfort and solace.* **”**

Kaltoumi finds solace in rebuilding her life in a foreign land thanks to the solidarity of the ShelterBox community.



DEPLOYMENT HIGHLIGHT

CAMEROON



The Syrian crisis has been ShelterBox's largest and most sustained response. As we reach the 12-year anniversary, over 13 million people have been displaced by the conflict.

ShelterBox has supported more than 400,000 people in the region since we first responded to the crisis in December 2012. News of the conflict rarely makes the headlines, but it rages on. And the political stalemate means the future is as uncertain as ever. As the fighting continues, millions of displaced Syrians face brutal winters, floods that wash away shelters, financial issues and the additional threat of disease due to overcrowding.

In 2022, we continued to focus on meeting the needs of vulnerable households. Together with our partners **Bahar Organization** and **ReliefAid**, we continued to distribute tents and tools and materials to weatherproof and repair shelters. Our aid package also included mattresses, blankets, solar lights, and warm clothes for the harsh Syrian winter. We also continued the distribution of hygiene kits to help prevent the spread of disease. **We will continue to stand alongside families and communities whose lives are overwhelmed by this devastating conflict.**

SYRIA

ALI'S STORY

In the heart of the northwest region of Syria, amidst the relentless turmoil of conflict, we find a story of resilience and hope.

Meet Ali, a father of nine, who, along with his wife, has been forced to uproot his family three times in just four years due to the escalating violence in Syria. Their journey has led them to a makeshift home in a displacement camp, where they face the harsh realities of long-term displacement.

Ali recounted the moment that changed their lives forever, saying, *"We were displaced at the beginning of 2018. We left because of the bombing and the war; we left our homes and properties and tried to survive with our lives."*

Before the violence their lives were starkly different. Ali reminisced, *"I lived in a house. But now, life is very difficult, there are no job opportunities and no income. A man who has a family of ten people needs [to make] money."*

Ali described the harsh winter conditions in the camp, saying, *"Winter is difficult for those living in tents. The tents are worn out and need to be renewed or repaired. We need mattresses, blankets, and tarps, so that we are ready for the cold."*

Thanks to generous individuals like you ShelterBox provided winterized shelter and household aid to 2,000 households, including Ali's. Additionally, we reached 800 households with tent leveling support and essential materials like tarps and ropes.





DEPLOYMENT HIGHLIGHT

ETHIOPIA

The crisis in Ethiopia has left millions of people in need. We have supported over 60,000 people in Ethiopia since 2018. Items like tarps, rope, blankets, sleeping mats, mosquito nets, water carriers and cook sets are helping people to survive in the increasing insecurity. Working with our partner **International Organization for Migration (IOM)**, we have supported a total of 22,000 people in the Afar and Somali regions in the last year.



DEPLOYMENT HIGHLIGHT

BURKINA FASO

Burkina Faso is one of the fastest-growing displacement crises on the continent. Over 1.9 million people have been forced to flee their homes due to extremist violence. Despite the challenges, we have been working with our partner **HELP** to support the most vulnerable communities. Together we've supported over 4,000 families since 2022 with tarps, cook sets, sleeping mats, blankets, soap and buckets.





DEPLOYMENT HIGHLIGHT NIGERIA

The violent rise of Boko Haram began in Nigeria in 2009, when Boko Haram started an armed rebellion against the Nigerian government. Since then, the conflict has grown. ShelterBox has been in Nigeria with our partner **ACTED** since 2018. We have previously provided over 11,000 families with lifesaving items like tents, tarps, Shelter Kits, cook sets, mosquito nets, water carriers, solar lights, and blankets, and are planning another project to support more families.



DEPLOYMENT HIGHLIGHT MOZAMBIQUE

The conflict in northern Mozambique is driving one of the world's fastest-growing displacement crises. Since October 2017, an Islamic extremist group has been launching violent attacks on civilians in the northern province of Cabo Delgado. With help from our partner **CARE** Mozambique, we have supported vulnerable communities with Shelter Kits, thermal blankets, solar lights, cook sets, sleeping mats, and mosquito nets. Future project planning is underway.

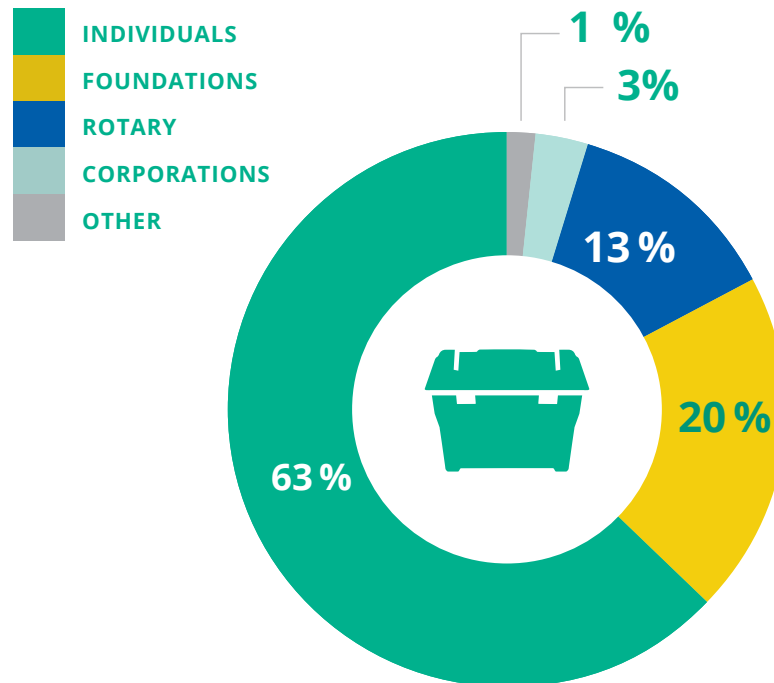

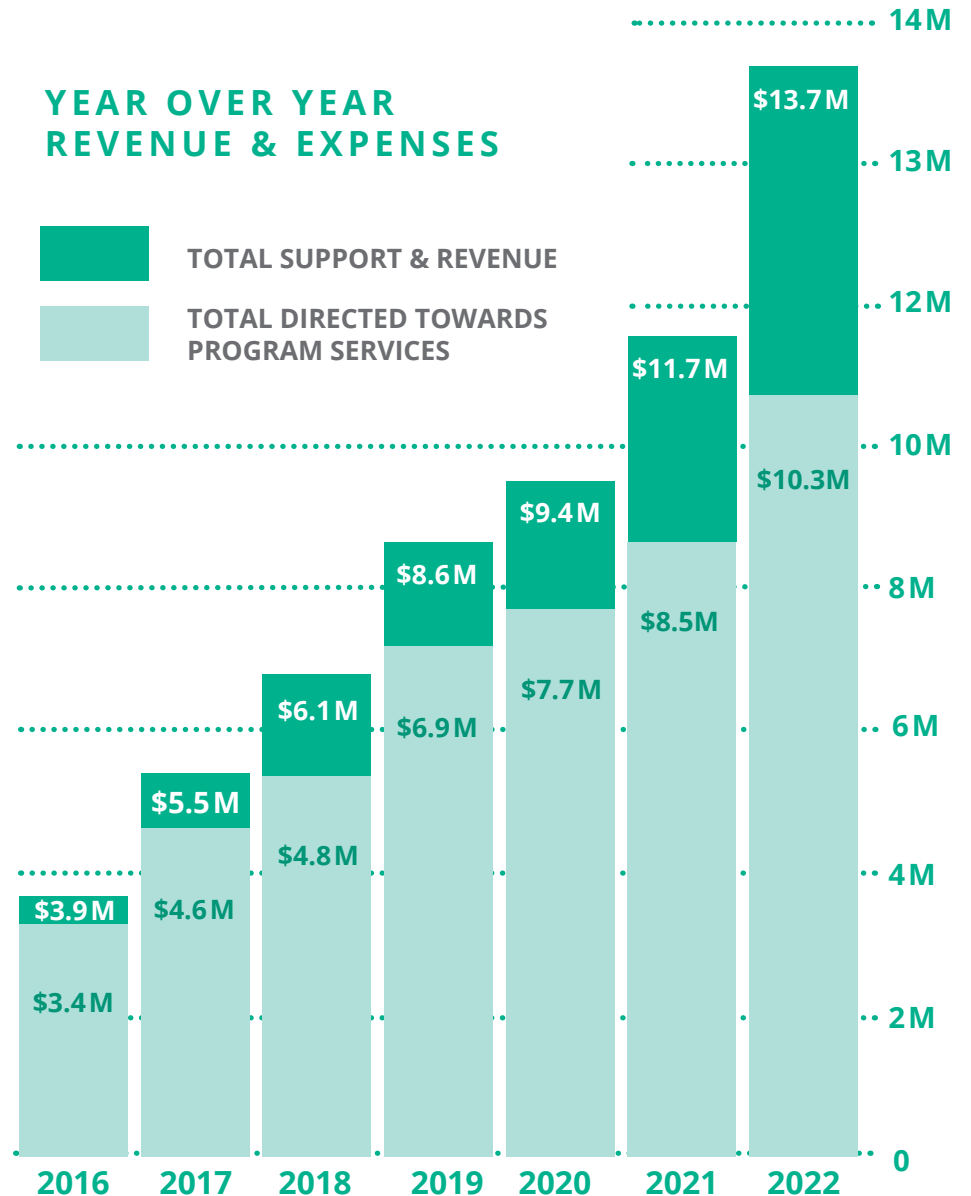

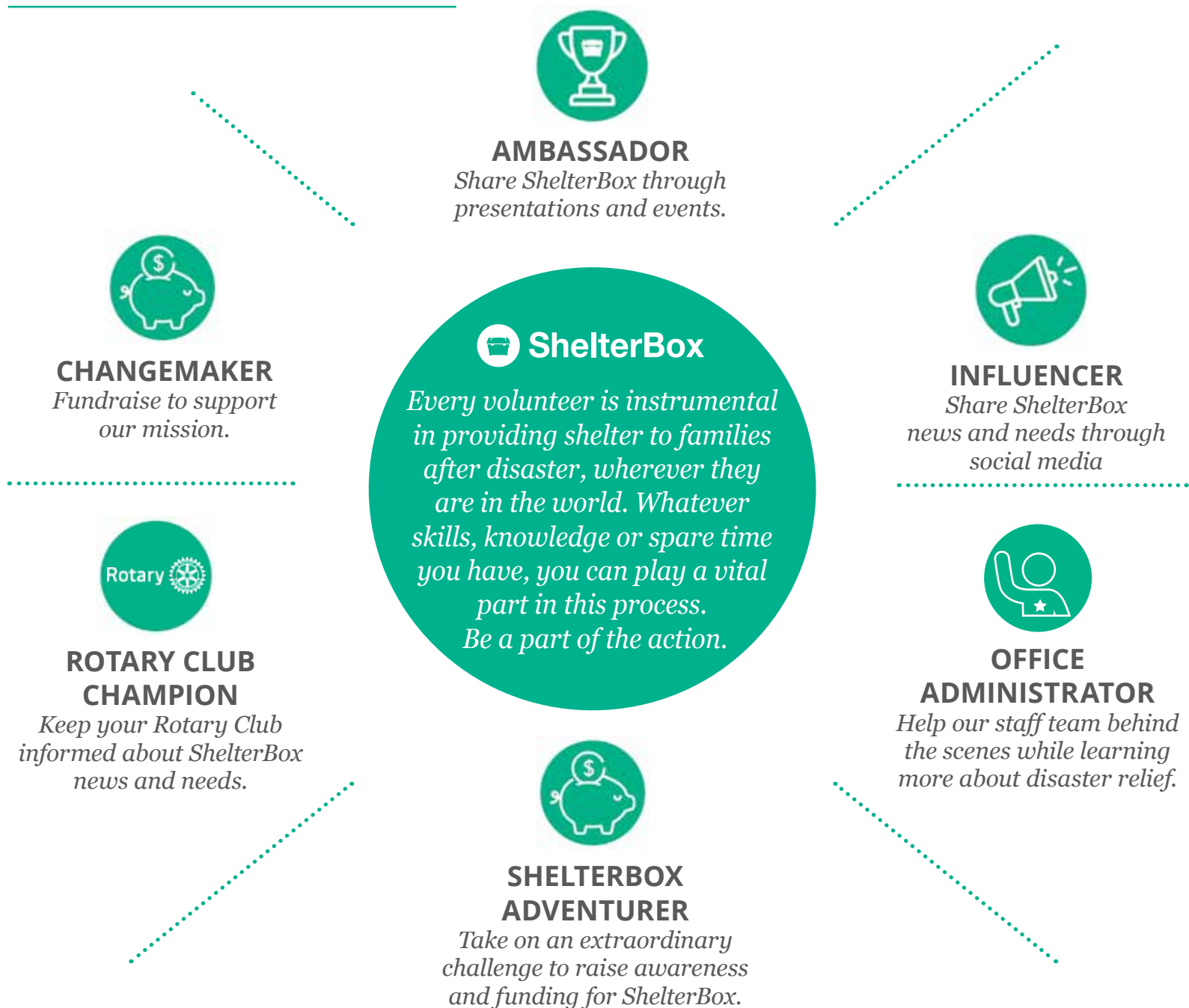

THE EVERESTING CHALLENGE

Steven Tonkinson's 29,029-foot climb in 30 hours for ShelterBox

ShelterBox Board member, Response Team Member, and Ambassador Steven "Tonk" Tonkinson made ShelterBox history with his epic Everest-ing Challenge in August of 2022. 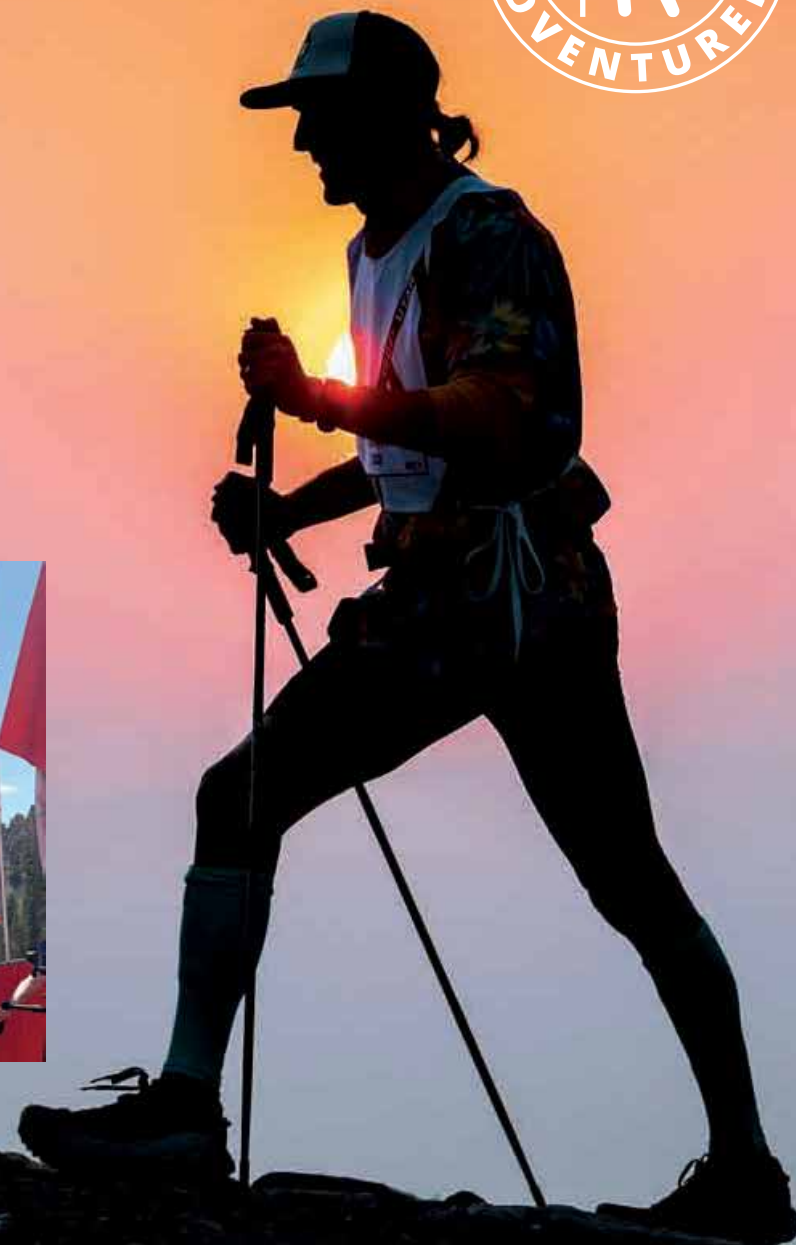
